

Concordia, Faubion a Beautiful Friendship

For more than 50 years, they lived across the street from one another in Northeast Portland, neighbors and casual admirers. Now and then, their kids hung out together, but even on the loneliest summer nights, they never dreamed they were meant to grow old together, entwined and inseparable.

On a September morning in 2007, Joel Schuldheisz finally slipped across that street, Northeast 29th, and into the office of Faubion principal LaShawn Lee. On Lee's first day at the school, Schuldheisz, an education professor at Concordia University, welcomed her to the neighborhood by asking "What do you need?"

Lee didn't hesitate. "We haven't had an art teacher in decades," she said, and before she caught her breath, Concordia returned with enough students and art supplies to light up half of her pre-K-8 classrooms.

From the beginning, they couldn't get enough of one another, the private Lutheran college and the languishing public school. Each time Concordia arrived at her door, heart in hand, Lee realized she was answering the university's prayers even as they answered hers.

Mentors for her IEP students? Student nurses? Varsity athletes to shepherd the school's playground and nutrition program? Lee never heard the word, "No," only "The places we will go."

Six years on, the seamless, blessed union of Faubion and Concordia remains the hallmark collaboration in the Portland Public Schools system.

Test scores are up, recess referral rates down at Faubion, which draws from the largest geographical area in the district.

Architects are seeking community input this Saturday for Faubion's \$27.5 million redesign, a construction job financed by the district's \$482 million bond measure. Concordia is determined to raise at least another \$7.5 million to add an early childhood development center and other facilities to the mix.

While Faubion students have reasonably unfettered access to the university's library and athletic facilities, at least 200 Concordia students cross Northeast 29th on a daily basis to round out their college education in elementary-school classrooms. Three of the course requirements for education majors are rooted in the raucous interaction with kids on that overcrowded campus.

"We're a Christian university preparing leaders for the transformation of society," said Gary Withers, Concordia's executive vice president, and for once that message is meant to inspire, not intimidate.

In the middle of this transformation is Keylah Boyer, Concordia's new director of urban education, and a woman who seems destined to one day run the university, if not the state.

Boyer was in sixth grade, and Faubion still a K-5 school, when her parents moved into a house off Northeast Dekum Street. She attended Central Catholic High School, then Grambling State University in Louisiana, and she may never have returned to the neighborhood if her grandfather Henry Knawls, a rugged old Lutheran, hadn't fallen ill at the beginning of her junior year.

She came back to Portland to be with her grandfather until his death in 1995, completing her college education at Concordia. After teaching for seven years at Astor School and SEI Academy—which only enforced her sense of how much more is possible when a bounty of resources are available—she returned to Concordia to direct its undergraduate program in the College of Education.

Boyer's new assignment will change dramatically as Faubion is razed and rebuilt. "We don't have space for 21st century learning," Vice-Principal Jennifer McCalley notes. "The classrooms are set up for everyone to sit at their own desk and stare at 'the board.' We have no room for a computer lab. We have music going on on the stage in the cafeteria with the curtain drawn while other students are eating lunch. Our roof leaks in ... well, every location right now."

And Boyer and her Concordia students are diligently trying to fill the gaps. "I was asked again today, 'What do you want next?'" McCalley said. "It does sound too good to be true."

When asked how to replicate this extraordinary collaboration—which is part of Concordia's grand design—Boyer said, "It starts with leadership. And the leadership needs to be visionary, and willing to let people in the door. That was LaShawn. You can't block the door and say, 'No, we don't want to do anything innovative and creative.'"

Six years on, it may be time to ask why other Portlandarea colleges haven't formed a similar bond with the nearest elementary school in their neighborhood.

But for the moment, let's continue to marvel at what is possible when a university and an at-risk school are willing to wed their fortunes together.


"I don't want to think about us not having Concordia here," Lee said. "We would not be talking about building a new school. We would not be talking about children achieving academically. We would not be talking about parents trusting us to educate their children here if we didn't have this committed relation with Concordia University."

Volga-German Mileage Chart by Michael Frank

These past several weeks or so I have been working on a special project (Excel spreadsheet) to calculate distances between 62 Volga-German villages in the Saratov Oblast and selected Russian towns using published GPS coordinates. In all, about 3,600 distances have been calculated (this includes point a to point b and point b to point a). I am refining the accuracy of these coordinates and recalculating mileage to reflect major village intersections, not nearby fields, using Google Earth. Clearly taken into account are village military maps posted at CVGS showing terrain and landmarks, and ground-based photographs pinpointing the view as each photograph was taken. Razed villages are clearly shown and noted in the spreadsheet. The villages include:

Anton, Balzer, Bauer, Beideck, Degott, Dietel, Dobrinka, Dönhof, Dreispitz, Erlenbach, Frank, Frank Khutor, Franzosen, Galka, Göbel, Grimm, Herzog, Holstein, Huck, Husaren, Hildmann, Hussenbach, Josefstal, Kamenka, Kautz, Koehler, Kolb, Kraft, Kratzke, Leichtling, Kutter, Marienfeld, Merkel, Messer, Moor, Mueller, Neu-Balzer, Neu-Dönhof, Neu-Messer, Neu-Norka, Neu-Straub, Norka, Oberdorf, Pfeifer, Pobochnoye, Rosenberg, Rothammel, Shcherbakovka, Schilling, Schwab, Sewald, Semenkovka, Stephan, Unterdorf, Volmer, Walter, Walter Khutor, and Yagodnaya Polyana.




The distances are reflected "as the crow flies" and this crow has been busy! Miles are rounded down or up and are shown as whole numbers on the chart but when individual cells are selected, the result is shown with 2 decimal accuracy. In addition to the Volga-German villages in the Saratov Oblast, Kamyshin, Saratov, Sarepta, and Volgograd are also listed.

I am also working on creating a mileage chart for those villages in the Samara Oblast. It appears this chart will be a bit larger with about 73 villages and towns. Unfortunately, I am finding errors, some major, in some of the AHSGR-posted coordinates for some villages and am correcting those as I go. My findings will be presented to the CVGS website coordinator for confirmation. The online coordinate distance calculator I use can be found at: http://boulter.com/gps/distance/.

My thanks to Brent Mai and Dorothy Brandner and other Oregon chapter members for their invaluable support in making these charts a reality.

I found the posted coordinate for Eckheim (Skatovka) on the AHSGR.org website at North 47 00 East 51 15. It should really be North 50 47 East 46 54, a difference of 328 miles. From Google maps (top) you can see that this is still a viable village in Russia. One wonderful note about the military map posted on the CVGS website for Eckheim (bottom)...how accurate

it is in showing the placement of the village and the course of the river.






